The University is cautiously opening back up and your Alumni and Friends Association has been pressing on behind the scenes, mostly virtually.

Our annual meeting of the membership was Saturday, 5 June, 2021 at 0900 CDT via Zoom. Among other topics discussed were how we put your dues to good use from Treasurer CAPT(Ret) Scott Christensen and Alumnus/a and Young Alumnus/a of the Year by LCDR Austin Helm (nominations are due not later than 15 August). Also if you

We heard an update on aspects and events amid COVID-19 from Unit CO CAPT Matt Vandersluis, as well as on the Seapower Leadership Association's efforts to support the midshipmen from President/Chair LtCol (Ret) Albert Lagore. CAPT(Ret) Mike Good briefed us on membership, and Mr. Phil Claiborne on our social media outreach. We hope to hear about networking progress from LCDR Ida Quigley at our next Board meeting.

You will recall that with the COVID-19-caused cancellation of the MU-wide 2020 Reunion weekend, we also postponed our annual NROTC Reunion and luncheon scheduled for 6 June, 2020. This year LCDR(Ret) Ed Taicsich planned our "Open House" virtually immediately after the annual meeting. Those classes who would have normally celebrated their special anniversary years in 2020 (ending in "0" and "5") were combined with this year's. Those who participated made it memorable.

We continue to stress two main areas of concentration:

1. Increasing membership and 2. Broadening outreach

Our third area, last year's "Value Delivery", was subsumed into what LtCol(Ret) Albert Lagore introduced as "Pillars". For 2021 the A&FA Board settled on:

We have endeavored to support our newest defenders of the Constitution by funding service or warfare specific professional reading selections for the graduates. 2020 ALUMNI OF THE YEAR & YOUNG ALUMNI OF THE YEAR

William Hayes, III, CLASS OF 1962: 2020 Alumnus of the Year

The 2020 Alumnus of the Year is William Hayes, III, nominated by the Marquette University NROTC Alumni & Friends Association Board. Until his death in January of 2020, Bill was Vice President of the MU NROTC A&FA and awards program coordinator.

After MU, Bill served four years as Marine Platoon Commander, Company Executive Officer, Company Commander, and 2nd Marine Division Information Officer.

After his tour of duty at Camp Lejeune, NC, he was stationed to guard the U.S. Naval Base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. He spent six months with the Fleet Marine Force in the Mediterranean, aboard the USS OGLETHORPE (AKA 100). Bill spent a month off Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, aboard the USS OKINAWA (LPH 3), during a 1965 rebel uprising. Bill resigned his commission from the Marine Corps as Captain in '66.



Post service, Bill served in many positions at Jos. Schlitz Brewing Co. of Milwaukee in sales, marketing, advertising, training, copywriting and editing. Later, Bill was Corporate Director, National Retail Sales of Stroh Brewery. Returning to his journalism roots, in 1990 he became Senior Account Executive at Grocery Marketing Magazine. He was soon recruited by the Independent Grocers Alliance (IGA) as Associate Publisher/ Editor in Chief. While their son Patrick was at Marquette, Bill with wife Carol were co-chairs of the MU Parents Association 1994-96.

LCDR Ida T. Quigley, USN: 2020 Young Alumna of the Year



LCDR Ida T. Quigley, USN is the Marquette NROTC Alumni & Friends Association's 2020 recipient of the Young Alumna of the Year award. LCDR Quigley is currently the Officer of Security Cooperation (OSC) Chief, Paramaribo, Republic of Suriname where she advises senior embassy personnel on political-military operations and relations with other nations.

LCDR Quigley graduated from Marquette University in May, 2011 with a degree in Biomedical Sciences and a minor in Theology. After commissioning, her first assignment was as Strike Division Officer on the USS LEYTE GULF (CG 55) in Norfolk, Virginia. As a division officer, she led her strike team through the Strike Certification Process and played a vital role as one of the lead Anti-Terrorist Tactical Watch Officers to certify the Leyte for AT. While the Leyte underwent its midlife cycle overhaul, Ensign Quigley was assigned to the USS NITZE (DDG 94) for seven months during its deployment through the Mediterranean Sea, Suez Canal and Persian Gulf in 5th Fleet.

In July 2014 LT Quigley was the Navigator and 1st LT on the Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) Crew 108. LT Quigley played a major role in the ship's navigation and aviation firefighting certifications leading to the crew's commissioning six months early. Crew 108 was assigned for the commissioning of the USS MILWAUKEE (LCS 5) and stayed aboard until November of 2016. The ship proceeded through 12 Great Lakes locks with 12 arduous sea and anchor details. She was assigned as the Supply Officer Department Head. LCDR Quigley since served as Assistant Program manager for the Littoral Combat Ship Immersive Virtual Shipboard Environment, including participation in Mission Bay trainers, bridge trainers and SPS-73 radar support.

After selection as a Foreign Area Officer, LCRD Quigley received a Masters in National Security Studies from the Naval Postgraduate School, plus an Intelligence Certificate and completed JMEP I.

Her awards include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, the Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation Ribbon, National Defense Service Ribbon, Navy "E" Ribbon 2nd Award, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, and Navy Sea Service Deployment Ribbon.

2020 Financial Summary of the Marquette NROTC Alumni and Friends Association (A&FA)

In 2020, members paid \$3,911.30 in dues to A&FA and donated an additional \$161.80 to the organization. From these funds, \$1,555.92 was used to pay expenses and the remaining \$2,517.18 bolstered the Association's cash balance which is deposited in a bank checking account. We started last year with total cash of \$13,144.36 and ended 2020 with total cash of \$15,661.54. All 2020 expenses were paid.

The biggest annual expenses in 2020 were the membership management system subscription and video conferencing for remote board meetings. The cancellation of the alumni open house reduced A&FA's 2020 expenses.

2020 Financial Summary of the Seapower Leadership Association (SLA)

In 2020, alumni and friends donated \$9,893.55 to the SLA. Of this amount, \$4,000.00 was spent on support of midshipman activities. Another \$535.00 was used to purchase the naval sword presented in the Spring to the outstanding graduating Navy-option Unrestricted Line midshipman. SLA also paid \$94.04 for a commissioning kit that was awarded to the top Marquette nursing graduate entering the Navy Nursing Corps.

SLA started 2020 with cash in its bank checking account of \$27,643.57 and ended the year with a cash balance of \$32,898.08. Thanks to you your generosity, we were able to support the midshipmen and build the net worth of the SLA for the future.

- If the new member has been a "free" New Graduate Member for two years after commissioning, but not made the leap to paid dues status, they still "count" as a new recruit.

And...if you bring one of our fellow "lapsed" members back into the fold, we'll also reward your effort.

Our internet "cloud" based membership management system (hosted by Wild Apricot) allows every member access from their own computer. Check us out at: https://marquette-nrotc-alumni.org. We have an online sign-up and debit/credit card payment method for dues (and donations) like many non-profits to simplify the membership process. 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


My motivation to join the Navy was rooted in patriotism, supporting the war effort primarily by rehabilitating our Sailors and Marines as a nurse.




